Dehydration in seniors can be potentially life threatening, especially during the summer when the temperatures soar. Here are 7 hydration tips for seniors that caregivers can use to help the elderly stay hydrated all year round.

Seniors can stay hydrated by making sure they:

- 1. Take frequent drink breaks throughout the day.
- 2. **Drink 6-8 glasses** of water that is the daily-recommended intake of fluids and water for those that are not on a restricted fluid diet.
- 3. Drink 1-2 glasses of water first thing upon waking up.
- 4. Add extra flavour to the water.
- 5. **Eat fruits** with high water content.
- 6. Keep cool stay in air-conditioned spaces during heat waves heat alerts. It is air conditioned on the main floor
- 7. Reduce sun exposure.





HISTORY OF "O CANADA"

"O Canada" - The Canadian National Anthem

Originally, "O Canada" was a patriotic poem by Sir Adolphe-Basile Routhier, a Quebec judge. Calixa Lavallée, the well-known Canadian composer, was commissioned to set it to music, and it was first sung in 1880 during a national convention of French Canadians in Quebec City. The French words to the song have remained the same to this day.

The English version, however, has a more interesting history. When Routhier's lyrics were first published in Toronto, a doctor named Thomas Bedford Richardson translated the words into English and changed them to fit the melody. Two years later, the first edition of the Canadian version of *Collier's Weekly* held a competition to rewrite the English lyrics to the song. Mercy E. Powell McCulloch won the competition with her entry.

The words were rewritten repeatedly, but one version gained the most popularity. It was written by Montreal lawyer Robert Stanley Weir in 1908 in honor of the 300th anniversary of the founding of Quebec City. It was amended in 1913, 1914, and 1916 and published in an official form for the Diamond Jubilee of Confederation in 1927. A slightly modified version of the first verse of Weir's poem was proclaimed as Canada's national anthem in 1980.
